The NY Energy Democracy Alliance (NYEDA)

- Began on the eve of 2014 NYS climate march
- 15+ member organizations, 25+collaborating groups
- Focuses on leveraging & influencing Reforming the Energy Vision (REV) process.
- Advances a just and participatory transition to a resilient, localized, and democratically controlled clean energy economy in New York State.
- Envisions a renewable energy system that is led by and prioritizes solutions for low- and moderate-income communities and communities of color who are most impacted by our current energy and economic system.
- Transforms our communities' relationship to power through advocacy, organizing, job creation, coalitionbuilding, policy research, and public education for an equitable, sustainable energy future.

What is CoShare?

- An initiative of the New York Energy Democracy Alliance (NYEDA).
- A member-based network of community organizations and local energy practitioners
- Working to advance locally controlled, community-based shared renewable energy projects across New York State.
- Currently focused on supporting community shared solar (CSS) development.

Why did NYEDA create CoShare?

 NYEDA and many of its members worked with the coalition led by Vote Solar that successfully advocated for regulation to enable CSS in NY.

No business model development by NYS for CSS.

 Begin CoShare to create a shared knowledge base and support for community based development.

Why Community owned?

 Our existing energy system is corporate controlled, with most benefits going to shareholders.

 New York's emerging clean energy transformation could easily go the same way.

 Community owned energy projects create more local jobs, economic benefit, and can be a cornerstone of a just transition to an affordable and climate friendly energy system.

What CoShare Does

- Disseminate & Discuss CSS
 - Best practices, case studies, development support
 - Lessons learned& Cautionary tales
 - Participate in other CSS spaces: e.g. National Community Solar Partnership
- Collaborate and partner with key stakeholders, agencies, and organizations.
- Advocate for policies and regulations to support community ownership or control of CSS projects that broaden access to solar.
 - e.g. DPS CDGLI collaborative

CSS Development Elements

- Project finance options (task force, webinar, resources)
- Navigating Interconnection (task force, webinar, resources)
- Choosing a cloud customer management partner
- Choosing your business model.
- Project sites Identifying, Screening, leasing.
- The shared solar development process, step by step.

Business Model Choice is key

- Who will be the owners of the system?
- Where will development & construction capital come from?
- What size will the project be?
- Do you have an effective early viability screen for property?
- Who will the members be and on what terms?
- Who will operate and maintain the system and serve the members over 20 years?

CSS Customer & Investor Identification

Engineering, Procurement, Construction (EPC) Company Identification - Preference for Local / Regional Partner

Utility Interconnection: Pre-Application

Initial Environmental Assessment Site Walk

Utility Interconnection: Application - Can take significant time for utilities to turn around -- if risk capital is available sooner, best to start asap.

Utility Interconnection: System Impact Study - Typically only triggered for projects >500 kW

Organizations and individuals who are interested in joining the growing COSHARE NYS network are encouraged to complete a membership request by clicking on the 'JOIN' page above.



The **Sidebar** lets members know who else is online at any given moment, and to live chat in groups


Live chat particularly useful for members to communicate during conference calls. File upload and sharing capability built in.








Members can start **project pages** to post information about existing projects, share project-related documents, and receive comment feedback and inquiries from other members
